# "Free the Girls" Challenge issued

At the GFWC of Montana Eastern District meeting in Billings, Montana, members and clubs donated gently used bras to donate to Free the Girls. Free The Girls is a 501c3 non-profit organization that provides job opportunities to survivors of sex trafficking in developing countries. The women in the programs receive their starting inventory as a donation and buy additional inventory at below wholesale value to maintain a competitive edge in their marketplace.

Eastern District challenges themselves, Central, and Western District members to bring your gently used bras to the Fall Board meeting to donate to the project. Check out the graveyard side of your underwear drawer and bring any bras that you don't wear or need.

Your donations will be packed up and sent to Third World countries where organization partners in aftercare facilities will provide the opportunity for sex-trafficking survivors to build their own business selling second-hand clothing while going to school, building a house, and caring for their families.

# GFWC MT bylaws: Article VI, Board of Directors

Section 6.2, Composition. The Board of Directors shall consist of:

- A. Elected Personnel: GFWC MT Officers, District Presidents, Club Presidents, Past State Presidents, Past State Directors of Junior Clubs and Honorary Vice Presidents.
- B. Appointed Personnel; Chairmen of Community Service Programs, Chairmen and committee members of Special Projects, Special Assignments and Standing Committees, Parliamentary Advisor, Corresponding Secretary, Chairman of Budget & Finance Committee, and The Montana Woman staff.
- Section 6.4, Duties. The Board of Directors shall:
  - A. Transact business of GFWC MT between biennial conventions.
- B. Delegate to the Executive Committee such power as it deems necessary, provided that such power does not entail expenditure of more than what is within the limits of the budget and policy of GFWC MT.
- C. Adopt the budget and decide upon investments of funds recommended by the Budget and Finance Committee.
- D. Adopt standing rules. Such rules may be adopted by a majority vote at any meeting without previous notice, may be suspended by a majority vote, amended or rescinded by a two-thirds (2/3) vote.
- E. Authorize contracts when necessary for the business of GFWC MT *Standing rule #8*:

Members of the Board of Directors may be reimbursed traveling expenses for attending GFWC MT Board of Directors meetings. Her claim for transportation shall be based on actual rate of 25 cents per mile one way. If she gives transportation to other members of the Board of Directors, also eligible for traveling expenses, her bill for transportation shall be construed as covering the traveling expenses of all her passengers.

Operation Smile doctors have provided more than 220,000 free surgical procedures for children and young adults born with cleft lip, cleft palate, and other facial deformities.
