Then they divided into groups of 5-6 and were given a worksheet to practice what they had been taught. Twelve dozen Ginger Snap Cookies baked by a member were sent after the program to each class for the children to enjoy along with a note saying "When you read, life 'snaps' into place."

2016 Communication and Public Relations

The official Holiday Season in Billings begins with the Holiday Parade, and Billings Juniors are a part of it. They worked months ahead of time gathering over 6000 gently used or/and new books. Each book had a BJWC nameplate attached and then a Dr. Seuss bookmark placed inside it. Books were sorted into two age groups and boxed to await the float. 5000+ excited children received a book, a bookmark and a bit of happiness from members and friends who walked the two-mile parade route. and earned the "Best of the best floats!" Imagine the multitude of people who were introduced to GFWC Billings Junior Woman's Club when the local TV station broadcast and rebroadcast images of the parade.

2016 Membership

Instead of meetings in the summer, BJWC sponsors a Summer University. Some events are for pure enjoyment, others are to learn a new skill and some are to do volunteer community improvement. Most costs are minimal and are paid by the participants. Any member can plan an event of their choosing. Attendance may be 3-4 or even 15-20. So what events have been popular? Outings to summer concerts, the zoo, the Audubon Center, Tippet Rise and painting centers have all been repeat events. Some summers we have five events and other summers ten events.

The summer of 2018 has multiple outings in the works, i.e. a bus trip to Nearly New in Ennis for the day.

2016 Advocates for Children CASA

Five of BJWC members are Court Appointed Special Advocates, court appointed to advocate for a child or group of children (1-5) who have been placed into the foster care system. Most often CASAs will see a child in the foster home and/or at school. Monthly reports on the child's health, education progress, safety, and wishes are prepared and distributed to the attorneys and caseworkers. When caseworkers and attorneys have 50-60 children to be

responsible for at a time, a CASA's input has proven to be very valuable. Through CASA, one of our members works with the Drug Court, two lead monthly education discussion groups, one is a peer coordinator mentoring 5-6 newer CASAs and one is the past-president of the Board of Directors of Yellowstone CASA.

2017 Conservation

This very small group of committee members have made major contributions to conservation through tours and working with youth. BJWC presented 100 Douglas fir seedlings to 4th and 5th grade students and sponsored a speaker who talked about the importance of trees in our environment and taught the students on how to plant and care for a tree.

2017 Legislative/Public Policy

One of our members is very active in the local political clubs and thus has a wealth of knowledge that she can distribute. We are updated on legislation and given contact information.

2017 Education

Read to Your Bunny is a program designed by one of our members to teach young parents the importance of reading out loud to young children. Three Reading Ladies demonstrate for the parents, provide them with books and even have a quilt drawing for attending. Trainings are held at Young Families (daycare for high school mothers and fathers), Domestic Violence Centers and other places. The Reading Ladies are the readers and presenters of the program.

2017 Domestic Violence Prevention

BJWC members support Angela's Piazza, a gathering and educating center providing information and assistance in escaping domestic violence relationships. Club members donate materials and attend the Souper Bowl fundraiser. Local potters donate soup bowls for purchase and local eateries donate their best soups for a fun luncheon on Super Bowl Friday.

2017 Advocates for Children Youth Service Center

The Ted Lechner Youth Services Center (YSC) provides housing for foster care youth who have struggled finding an appropriate placement. This facility can house up to 14 teenagers from all across Montana. Most attend a local middle or high school but some are digitally connected to their former schools. BJWC has long been a provider of a hygiene tree at Christmas time. The center provides the tree and we cover it with hygiene items; tooth brushes, toothpaste, dental floss, hair ribbons, nail polish, nail clippers, emery boards, socks, mittens, activity books, headphones and even a few stuffed animals. Each good day during December the youth are allowed one item. What is left is kept for use throughout the year. The day of decorating, we bring treats and spend about an hour visiting with the youth.

At the club Christmas party we have a fundraiser for the YSC to use for their outings/activities during the year. We donate \$300 to that fund which covers the cost for chaperones as most often the youth receive complimentary tickets.

Additional funds raised at the club party have been used to update the YSC library. Over the last couple of years, the bookshelves have been replaced and stocked with current popular books and DVD's. These books often venture into resident rooms and enjoyed. The Advocates supplement additional funding for Children club budget.

Just a few days before Christmas, BJWC members and husbands gather at Target to take the YSC residents shopping. Each is provided with an adult and a \$30 gift card to shop for friends, family, themselves or keep. This evening provides a positive interaction between adults and the youth. There are usually about 10-12 youth who will not have a home visit for Christmas.

2017 Arts Program

Billings Junior Woman's Club Arts Program uses a large portion of their yearly budget to assist area youth in attending summer camps emphasizing the Arts. Scholarships are given to the camp directors to distribute to worthy needy students.


Friday Night with Miss Montana plus the Fashionistas
