
#### First Contest - The World in Pictures

#### **Submission Guidelines:**

Short stories are limited to 2,000 words

Poetry entries can be any style, with minimum length of 8 lines and maximum of 50

#### **Student Entries:**

Must be typed, double-spaced, 1" margins on all sides

Student and teacher's names, name of school, sponsoring club and state, category, title of work and grade level on top right of each page

There are four grade level groupings: Category 1: K-2nd; Category 2: 3rd-5th; Category 3: 6th-8th; Category 4: 9th-12th

#### **Club Member Entries:**

Must be typed, double-spaced, 1" margins on all sides

Author's name, email address, mailing address, phone number, club name, state, category and title on top right of each page

### YOUTH WRITING CONTEST (Sponsored by the General Federation of Woman's Clubs)

**What**: An opportunity for students grades K-12 to express their creativity, compete with other students, be recognized for their work and possibly win awards by writing short story or poetry.

**How**: The writing assignments students normally do as part of their curricula would work well; **there is no need for extra projects on the part of teachers or students.** Parents sign a creative arts waiver. Students (or parents) type the entry in the specified format and, where possible, submit the entry electronically to the appropriate teacher who will forward it to the GFWC State Writing Chair, noted below.

**When**: Teachers gather entries until the December holiday break. Entries should be sent by e-mail with hard copy to the State Chair (contact information is below) any time prior to last week of February 2023. Writings are then submitted to a panel of judges who determine state winners for first, second and third place for both poetry and short story, for grade groups K-2, 3-5, 6-9 and 10-12. Those winners will receive recognition from GFWC/Montana as well as a small monetary award. The entries for the first place winners will be forwarded to GFWC/ international in Washington, DC to compete with writings by students across the U.S.

**Who**: The contest is sponsored by GFWC/International, a philanthropic organization dedicated to improving the lives of members of their community through volunteer service.

### *Forward to a Bigger and Brighter Future* GFWC Mission Valley Woman's Club

The GFWC Ronan Woman's Club has announced that it is expanding its outreach by changing its name to The GFWC Mission Valley Woman's Club (MVWC).

The newly identified club is expanding it's outreach to cover all of the Mission Valley of Montana, not just Ronan as reflected in the new MVWC logo (developed with the help Sarah Fryer of the GFWC Bitterroot Woman's Club).

The organization was created 105 years ago when some 20 Ronan women got together to form the club in the fall of 1917 as the Great War raged in Europe.

Over the next century, the woman's group made things happen in the city of Ronan. Those efforts included actively working toward the establishment of St. Luke Community Hospital in the early 1950's with bake sales, community plays, rummage sales and special dinners. One activity supporting the hospital involved knitting "booties" for newborns at the hospital.

The Ronan Woman's Club for years sponsored the Red Cross Blood Mobile and the Red Cross swimming program at Flathead Lake in Polson. The club was also instrumental in sponsoring the first polio vaccinations in the area to help stem the tide of the epidemic in the early 1950's.

The active group of women rolled up their sleeves to make sure that the Ronan City Library had a home on Main Street while providing much of the furnishings and fixtures for the building. Plus, as a forward looking organization, the club helped form the Mission Valley Heritage Association which would eventually establish The Garden of the Rockies Museum on Round Butte Road in Ronan. The support for the museum has not only included funding but also many hours of volunteer work. There is even a special section set aside in the museum to recognize the woman's club and its importance to the community.

There is so much more the club has done behind the scenes including giving scholarships to graduating seniors, sending girls to Girls' State, helping plant over 200 ash and elm trees around the community and assisting with the flower basket project for downtown beautification. That's in addition to assisting the Ronan Bread Basket and giving aid to the Florence Crittenton Home and Services in Helena.

One of the first steps of expanding outreach to other communities in the Mission Valley is offering scholarships to graduating seniors from all the schools in the Mission Valley including Polson, Ronan, Charlo, and St. Ignatius.

That's another a good reason for women throughout the Valley to come be a part of a group of women who like to get things done. The funding for the many projects the club is noted for is generated by the Annual Arts and Crafts Show traditionally held the first Saturday in April.

#### **GFWC Montana**

Begun as the *Woman's Voice* in 1921, the publication was changed in October 1924 to *The Montana Woman*. This insightful 34 page publication announced the formation of "Montana Products for Montana People" as the slogan of the **Department of American Home**'s new Division of Montana Products. The **Department of Public Welfare** wrote of the new Division of Indian Welfare, club's questions about mental hygiene, drug traffic, child welfare, so-cial and industrial conditions, and the call for club women to consider the subject of institutions for the care of the dependent and delinquent. The **Department of American Citizenship** stepped up to urge club women to instruct and inform women as to the platform of the political parties, the procedure to register to vote, and the effect of primaries. The **Department of Applied Education** championed the need for better and more efficient rural schools. **Department of Legislation** suggested clubs invite local lawyers to debate three issues—jury duty for women, repeal of the Medical Prescription Law, marriage and divorce bills. The newly formed **Department of Local History** challenged members to gather, compile, and record the facts and data involved in the discovery and settlement of their communities of the territory because the "actors in these great dramas of life will pass away." And finally, the **Department of International Relations** explored the composition, funding, and judiciary of the Permanent Court of International Justice.

These women of 98 years ago were strong, thoughtful, and devoted to their communities and homes — much like our members of today!
