Nominations and Elections Marsha Price, Elections Committee Chairman

It is important to start considering all your club members for State positions. Please let the Elections Committee know **ASAP** of anyone you think would be an excellent, officer candidate for GFWC MT from your club ordistrict. The committee will contact these members, determine their eligibility for an office as stated in the Bylaws, and seek their agreement to run for an office. Individuals are encouraged to also present their interest to the Elections Committee.

Candidates for President-elect, First Vice President, Recording Secretary and Treasurer must be endorsed by three clubs in her district or by the Board of Directors of her District. This being said, it will be easiest for the three Districts to endorse any candidates from their district during the District Meeting at the Fall Meeting in Butte from September 29-30, 2023.

Documentation of such endorsement shall include the signature of the President and Secretary of the page(s) of minutes of the meeting endorsing the candidate, or when polling by mail, email, or phone a statement regarding the outcome of such poll. December 15th of the odd years is the deadline for the GFWC MT Elections Chairman (GFWC MT Corresponding Secretary) to receive these endorsements.

The names of all eligible candidates will be published in the February *Montana Woman* in the even years. Nominations may be made from the floor during the Biennial Spring Convention after the report of the Elections Committee. Any nominee from the floor must meet the eligibility criteria stated in the Bylaws for the office being sought and have signatures from 25 delegates to the Convention.

Secure the Call Used Cell Phone Collection Beth Campbell, Chairman

Hundreds of thousands of people in this country are electronically isolated from readily available emergency services. They have no convenient way to dial 911. Ironically, the success of cell phone manufacturers has resulted in placing public pay phones on the endangered species list. If you don't have a phone of your own, you're cut off from most of the world most of the time. This includes senior citizens, domestic abuse victims, and children in crisis to name a few.



A second problem is electronic waste—broken or unwanted electronic assemblies of one kind or another—is threatening to choke our landfills with items that will not have properly biodegraded for thousands of years and contain significant quantities of toxic materials. Unwanted cell phones promise to become a large percentage of this waste.

What **Secure the Call** does is collect unwanted cell phones, inspect them at their home offices in Maryland, and select the used phones that work well enough to reused. They process and package them with chargers so that they can be immediately reused to acquire 911 services and ships them to agencies and institutions across the nation that redistribute the phones to individuals who are not only in need but at a high risk for needing emergency services. Any unusable phone is sent to a recycling center who trades the unusable phone for one that does.

Secure the Call never charges a fee for this or makes demands of the groups with whom they work. Their existence is a function of the continuing generosity and cooperation of the greater community. *And did we mention donating a phone is tax deductible*? It's a win-win, get rid of those old phones, give them a new purpose, and benefit those in need at the same time.

This is a call to all GFWC members to pull out your old phones, ask family, friends, and community members to do the same. Bring them to the State Fall Meeting September 29-30, 2023, in Butte and the State Biennial Convention April 19-20, 2024, in Helena. There will be a collection bin at both events that we can hopefully fill! Tax deductible forms will be available.

Do you know of an organization in Montana who may want to distribute the phones? Ask them. Let's get a list together for Secure the Call of agencies and organizations in our state willing to get these phones out to those in need.

Detailed execution plan with how you intend to achieve your goals Evaluation process – What's working, what's not, what may need to be changed, what's completed.

Offer Programs to Impact Communities

Create Organizational Leadership Strength

Strengthen and Increase Membership



National Day of Service September 30, 2023



The Butte Emergency Food Bank operates five days a week with the intention that no individual or family in the community experiences the fear and pain of hunger. Each year they distribute about 1,300,000 pounds of food—canned goods; boxed and bagged food; diapers; milk; bread and bakery items; meat and more—to Butte area residents, about 2,700 people each month.

As part of the **GFWC National Day of Service –Food Insecurity** on September 30th, clubs and attendees to the Fall Meeting are asked to bring non-perishable items. A presentation of the collected items will be made to the Butte Emergency Food Bank as a statewide participation in this national event.

During the recent 100 years celebration of a Montana woman's club, there was the opportunity to view a copy of the very first issue of *The Montana Woman* published in October 1924. Wonderful, thoughtful articles! You can read a copy at this link, https://mtmemory.recollectcms.com/nodes/view/107289.

Just recently there was a lightbulb moment – that means October 2024 will be the 100th anniversary for *The Montana Woman*! So how could this be volume 60? What went wrong? Volumes of a periodical represents each year of publication with the Issue being the sequence within that year. This first publication was "Vol. I, No. 1" and they did well through the February – March 1973 issue as XLIX No 3. This was the 49th volume, or 1924 plus 49 equals 1973. Then things get off track!

Blame it on Roman Numerals. Capital I is one, V is 5, X is 10, L is 50 and C is 100. The fun comes in when IV is 4 (one less than 5), IX is 9 (one less than 10), XL is 40 (10 less than 50). Thus, XLIX is 10 less than 50 plus one less than 10, or 49.

The April - May 1973 issue went off the tracks by saying it was volume XLX No 4 when it was really still XLIX until the fall publication at which time it would have become L. In 1975 they did the volumes as if the first issue was in 1904 when GFWC Montana was federated; September – October 1975 was LXXI for volume 71 plus 1904 to equal 1975. At some point in the early 1980s the volumes were numbered by administration then back to years, but from the wrong starting point!

In 1996 we gave up on the Roman Numerals and went to the Arabic Numerals we commonly use starting with Volume 42. This has continued with us of administration or years. Admittedly, this editor just picked up the numbers when she took over and went forward as yearly volumes, ending up with the erroneous volume 59 for the 2022-2023 issues. At the top of page one for this issue you will see that it now says Volume 99, Issue 1 – or should it be XCIX with the fall of 2024 becoming C?
