From the President





Let me begin with highlights of the September Fall Meeting in Butte. We were welcomed to Butte by Lorraine Hamry, Executive Director of the Butte Emergency Food Bank, who told their story that their 150 volunteers do to support their Community. She graciously accepted the Club food donations. On Saturday, the Deer Lodge Woman's Club provided the wonderful baskets that contained all the appropriate food groups to prepare a meal on Saturday Sept $30^{th} - GFWC$ National Service Day. Toni Molinario passed the Blessing Basket and \$971 was collected for the Butte Emergency Food Bank. Additional food & paper product donations brought later on Friday were presented to Lorraine's daughter along with the check. Lorraine wrote a thank you stating we had donated 300 lbs along with the monetary donation.

Friday evening, the theme was "How Many Hats Do You Wear", and the Mission Valley Woman's Club provided the centerpieces which were a collection of historical photos, and hats. I had requested people to write down how many hats they wore, the received a few submissions. However, one table cleverly compiled a "group" list; an example of Club Women team work in action. Our speaker was Jennifer Birnel, The Montana History Portal Director, which is the repository for our collection of the Montana Woman Magazine. Joyce Rogers contributed an article found later in this issue, with instructions on how to access.

Saturday, Cathy Mills, President Thompson Falls Woman's Club stepped right in to lead us in some "stretching – exercises" when our speaker had to cancel due to illness. Our primary evening speaker, an author and clothing designer also cancelled due to illness; and her book's graphic artist, Erica Mica, still came. She brought props of the clothing that Cindy Owings, designed and did an excellent job telling Cindy's story about her world travels which influenced her bright, colorful designs. Billings Junior Woman's Club decorated the tables to fit the "Barbie" theme. It was truly amazing, each table had different Barbie's and accessories which spanned decades! Pink was the color – theme and there were some pretty spectacular outfits worn by our members. We finished off the evening with Bunco with no charge to play, and non-cash prizes to the winners.

The Business Meeting included the Officer and Chairman Reports, and award presentations.

The President's project CARE Quilt raffle, the winner was Joyce Rogers, Past State President and member of the GFWC Mission Valley Woman's Cub.

The tickets for the Johnny Was designer blanket are still available for sale; and the drawing will be at convention in April.

The GFWC Montana 2024 Photo Calendar was delayed due to a change in the GFWC logo, which was not released until November 13th. The photos selected by each District are timeless, and we will have a jump start on sales. The calendar sales proceeds were approved to go to the GFWC Montana General Fund.



Any pictures to be submitted to the photo contest must be taken during 2023 and are due to this Chairman by April 1, 2024. So, tell us your story with photographs! There are two contests:

First Contest - The World in Pictures

Our World Up Close - Create a visual image that takes the viewer into a whole new, tiny world.

Natural Wonders - use wide angles and panoramas, or moody landscape images to showcase mountains, meadows, sand hills, rivers, waterfalls ,oceans, deserts, or any other magnificent vista.

Reflections - Feature a setting, situation, or landmark that brings back poignant memories, or capture a fleeting image reflected in glass, water, or another mirrored surface.

Second Contest - GFWC Living the Volunteer Spirit

These photographs capture the special moments in the lives of GFWC clubwomen as they meet, plan, advocate, volunteer, or celebrate, in groups or one-on-one.

Artwork Guidelines

*Photographs may be vertical or horizontal.

- *Photographs must be the original work of a dues paying member.
- *Each entry must be an 8" X 10" print mounted on a rigid board of the same size not to exceed 3/8" thick.

*No mattes, frames, or hangers.

*Photographs will NOT be returned.

- *A label must be affixed to the back with the following information:
 - Contest Name The World in Pictures with category or *GFWC Living the* Volunteer Spirit
 - Photographer's name, mailing address, email, phone number
 - Name and state of their club
 - Title and brief caption giving location, date, & other pertinent info about the picture
 - Arrow indicating top of the photograph

Must be High Resolution—300 Dots or pixels per inch emailed in "actual" size. Will need to be a large capacity format software such as Dropbox or Hightail.

 - Photographer's name, mailing address, email, phone number
 - Name and state of their club
 - Title and brief caption giving location, date, & other pertinent info about the picture

*Judges will look at the overall creativity of subject and quality of the photograph.

100 Books Before Graduation GFWC Thompson Falls Woman's Club



This is becoming a popular initiative across the country. Every community has its own needs and variations, but the goal is to stimulate a love for reading. The challenge has been offered by TFWC to all 9th-12th students from Thompson Falls west to include both Thompson Falls and Noxon High Schools plus home-schooled students.

Students enroll with a parent/guardian's approval in person or via email through the Thompson Falls Public Library. A reading log will be kept for each student at the Thompson Falls Public Library. Books must be reading level appropriate and may be a classroom assignment, but not the class textbook. The student may report a completed book in person or via email with a form stating the title, author, format, and signature of a

parent, guardian, teacher, or school counselor. Print, Ebooks, audiobooks, or other format are all acceptable.

Every book read will earn one entry into the quarterly drawing. There will be one top prize winner for a \$25 gift card and one \$10 gift card winner each quarter from all the entries. The winner will be offered a choice between two or three gift cards for local businesses such as gas or food or an Amazon card. A special \$100 gift card will be awarded to each student reaching 100 books before graduation.

The first drawing will be at the club's January 2024 meeting and they look forward to this event.



100th Anniversary Celebration Kickoff GFWC Plains Woman's Club

The witches won the contest hands down!





Highlights from Mapping Out a Club Strategic Plan CREATED BY: JOLIE FRANKFURTH, 2022-2024 GFWC SECOND VICE PRESIDENT

Following the August article in *Montana Woman*, you have met and answered three questions – Where are we now? Where are we going? How do we get there? Not all ideas will meet general consensus, so write the least popular on a sheet of paper for future consideration or combination. The next analysis stage is to take the highest-ranking strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats determined in the *Where are we now?* and answer the following questions:

- How do you use your strengths to take advantage of opportunities?
- How do you overcome weaknesses preventing you from benefitting from the opportunities?
- How can your strengths lessen the likelihood of threats? What can you do about your weaknesses to make the threats less likely?

Do not rush this process! It might take a full day or several gatherings to work through the questions. Expect *"How do we get there?"* to bring up ideas for change and hopefully enthusiasm for the planned direction and goals.

The process does not end here but needs monitoring on a regular basis. Not everything will work as thought and might need to be tweaked. Keep striving for the positive!

GFWC Montana

GFWC Montana welcomed Jennifer Birnel, Montana History Portal Director as the Fall Meeting Friday night dinner guest speaker. Her message:

"The Montana Woman" magazine Collection of issues from 1921 – 2023 is on The Montana History Portal website and is user friendly.

In the Fall of 2014 GFWC of Montana applied for a \$1500 Montana State Library Grant to have magazines from 1921 to 2014 scanned and placed on the mtmemory.org website. In 2015 we contributed \$1800 to cover additional costs. The initial upload process was not completed until 2017. In 2021, The Montana State Library changed web platforms and our Collection went offline until late 2022. It was cumbersome for members to use.

In 2023 Adina Fox and Joyce Rogers determined to find a way to present the collection chronologically. We met with Jennifer Birnel to find solutions. She agreed to reset the format to PDF and the magazine sequence using the year-month coding i.e. 1926-10 for October, 1926. It was a major task so we appreciate her so much.

There were other hurdles during the process. Thanks goes to all the Montana Clubwomen who helped make spreadsheets, searched their archives, sent copies of missing issues, and helped with computer transfers of 2014-2023 issues from our state website. Over 600 pages were added to the original data this year. The website is still missing many of The Montana Woman issues. We hope to have a "still missing" list by Spring, 2024.

Under the "Help" tab you will find tips on "Searching for an Item in a Collection." This will aide you in locating all types of fun facts about your club and members recorded in the history of GFWC of Montana. There are stories, poems, awards, reports, and so many pictures.


Jennifer asked that you contact Joyce Rogers if you find errors or have questions about the current site.

The really fun addition to the site is that clubs may add "collections" under our state organization. A great way to protect your club's history is by adding the club's Minutes as a collection! But you need not stop there; another collection could be historical fliers and documents, scrapbooks, pictures, reports, proclamations, etc. for your club.

How can your club get started? First your club will need to plan what to include in your collection then register with the Montana History Portal. Directions can also be found under the "Help" tab, "Using the Montana History Portal Site: Access and Initial Setup" or at www.msl.mt.gov/libraries/statewide_projects/montana_history_portal/.
